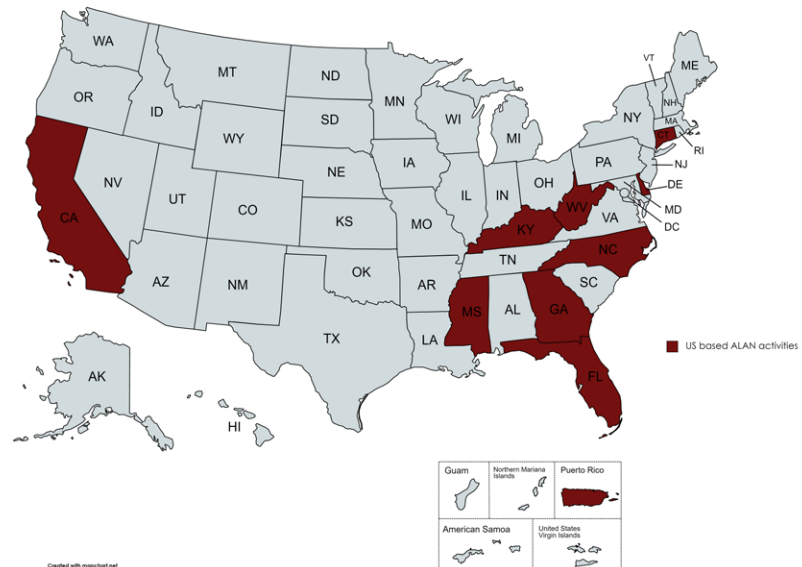

ALAN'S 2022 DISASTER RELIEF OPERATIONS

We may not have been present in person. But whenever disasters occurred, ALAN was there to provide the donated supply chain services and solutions that rescuers, first responders and humanitarian organizations needed in order to deliver help and hope more quickly.

9 disasters

Throughout 2022, ALAN activated for most of the major disasters that hit the United States as well as several other parts of the world, including Hurricane Ian, the war in Ukraine, the Eastern Kentucky floods, Hurricane Fiona, the Jackson, Mississippi, water crisis and the ongoing challenges associated with COVID-19. We also supported ongoing recovery efforts for survivors of previous years' disasters such as 2021's December tornadoes, Delaware floods, Haiti earthquake and Hurricane Ida.



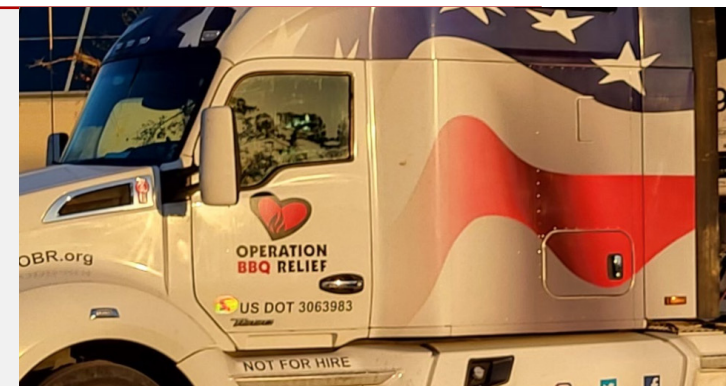


More than \$2.9 million worth of products stored or delivered

Disasters run the gamut, and so do the relief and recovery materials that humanitarian organizations need. During 2022, ALAN was honored to facilitate the storage, transportation, and handling of numerous essentials like bottled water, building supplies, mattresses, tarps, pet supplies and over-the-counter medicines – not to mention many other key items like:

- 35,000 pounds of donated peanut butter to assist earthquake survivors who were struggling with food insecurity
- 48 pallets' worth of hygiene kits to provide to the temporary residents of hurricane shelters
- 100,000 pounds' worth of bread, rice, vegetables, aluminum pans and frozen meals to help serve more than a million hot meals to hurricane responders and storm survivors
- dozens of replacement wheelchairs to assist storm survivors who had lost their home medical equipment (or who were newly in need of it)
- and countless pieces of PPE to help keep medical professionals and essential workers safe

Less than three days after Hurricane Ian hit, Operation Barbecue Relief was on-site and ready to serve nearly a million hot meals – thanks in part to ALAN and a dream team of in-kind donors who supplied the donated transportation required to ship 100,000 pounds' worth of bread, rice, vegetables, aluminum pans and frozen meals from various points across the country.



24 humanitarian groups assisted

Over the years, ALAN has served more than 60 non-profit groups whose missions address every type of survivor, service, and need imaginable. In 2022, we were proud to assist 24 of these hard-working humanitarian organizations, connecting them with everything from warehousing space and services to information, transportation, equipment and logistics expertise.

11 pieces of industrial equipment, 505 boxes and 40 rolls of stretch wrap loaned or donated; 1 large-scale warehouse consulting request fulfilled

When various non-profits needed material handling equipment or supplies to assist with post-disaster product distribution, nine ALAN partners stepped up with the loan or permanent donation of six electric pallet jacks, four forklifts, and one stretch wrap machine – and the gift of numerous boxes and rolls of stretch wrap. In addition to helping distribute hurricane preparation kits, these game-changing donations helped support mass feeding operations and local food bank efforts that distributed millions of pounds’ worth of relief to hurricane survivors within just a few weeks.

One ALAN in-kind donor also provided a much-needed gift of warehousing expertise so that critical relief and recovery supplies could be stored and staged more efficiently at community relief organizations in Southwest Florida.

21 loads carried/32,248 truck miles moved

Year after year, finding a way to get supplies shipped to disaster sites continues to be one of the biggest logistical challenges that non-profits face. In 2022, 12 generous companies answered ALAN's call to help humanitarian organizations carry critical relief and recovery supplies to 11 disaster-impacted destinations.



Six electric pallet jacks donated by ALAN in-kind donors after Hurricane Ian allowed several Southwest Florida non-profits to handle a record surge in demand with ease - and to distribute millions of pounds' worth of food to hurricane survivors in just a few weeks.

ALAN'S 2022 READINESS AND RESILIENCE ACTIVITIES AT A GLANCE

In some industries, activities like education, training and awareness are game-changers. But in the disaster relief space, they have the potential to be life-changers, because the additional preparation and more efficient response they enable can play a huge role in minimizing damage and hastening the road to recovery.

No wonder ALAN made it a point to educate and communicate in so many of the following ways throughout 2022.

7 disaster simulation exercises; 49 speeches, workshops and panel discussions

Created in 2013, ALAN's disaster simulation game continues to be an eye-opening and entertaining way for people to learn about the hidden opportunities and pitfalls of dealing with sudden catastrophic events. During 2022, we facilitated this hands-on learning session seven times, reaching approximately 411 supply chain, emergency management and non-profit professionals, and numerous college students. ALAN representatives also delivered or participated in 49 educational speeches, panel discussions or webinars, reaching a cross-sector of audiences and interests that ranged from global security, business continuity and supply chain resilience to humanitarian response and private-public partnerships.

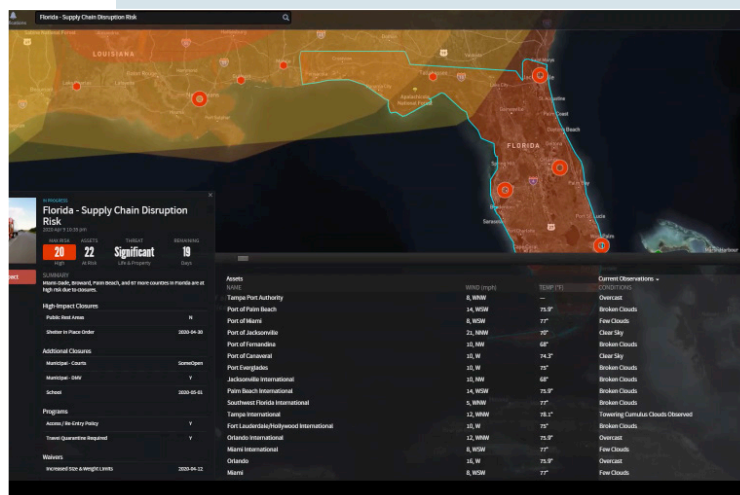

When disasters hit, pre-established relationships and a strong knowledge base are worth their weight in gold – a key reason why ALAN hosted nearly two dozen cross-industry discussions in 2022. These bi-weekly calls, which all of our association partners were invited to attend, played a key role in facilitating information flow and enabling participants to better understand the supply chain and disaster relief landscape so that they could prepare, collaborate and respond to catastrophes more effectively. We also hosted a special disaster logistics readiness session for various non-profit organizations at the start of hurricane season and co-hosted a business resilience call (with MIT's Humanitarian Supply Chain Laboratory) for 16 executives at major grocery store, freight movement and warehousing firms.

1 advanced logistics visibility tool

Few things are more vital for effective disaster response and recovery than the type of logistics visibility provided by ALAN's Supply Chain Intelligence Center, our free dashboard that's maintained by our partners at Everstream Analytics. In 2022, more than 663 subscribers (and counting) enjoyed access to this online tool, enabling them to get much-needed, real-time information about everything from the status of roads, ports and airports to the latest weather conditions around the globe.

Extensive disaster messaging

Last February, ALAN launched *ALAN In Action*, a new bi-monthly newsletter. Used in conjunction with the 44 Situation Reports we sent out to key stakeholders, it has allowed us to do a better job of keeping everyone in the loop about everything from our latest logistics requests to the importance of disaster preparation. We also created and/or distributed nearly 1,000 blogs, news releases, social media posts, media interviews and outreach messages in order to pass along key safety, preparation and relief information. In addition, ALAN representatives attended or exhibited at 18 conferences or educational events, allowing us to significantly expand and strengthen our working network and connect with a broader range of problem-solving resources.

THE SUPPLY CHAIN ANALYSIS NETWORK

In addition to helping numerous non-profits and businesses with disaster readiness, ALAN is proud to be an ongoing part of many government preparedness initiatives.

Since 2019, we have served as a member of the Ecosystem Assessment team for the Supply Chain Analysis Network (SCAN), a landmark research, assessment, and decision-support initiative that helps FEMA's Logistics Management Directorate gain a greater understanding of private-sector demand and supply networks during disasters. During 2022, this team supplied a National Strategic Supply Chain Assessment as well as detailed reports/analyses about supply chains in the Cascadia seismic zone and those disrupted by Hurricane Ian. These reports enabled FEMA LMD to make better-informed decisions about how to stabilize and/or restore critical supply chain networks after disasters.

And, since 2021 we have supported projects under the Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP), which plays a key role in strengthening our country's National Preparedness System. We supported three RGP projects in Washington and the San Francisco Bay area in 2022 (helping improve these areas' access to food and water following a catastrophic event). This work included co-developing a supply chain resilience seminar series and facilitating several workshops.
